A Note on the Author

Charles Dickens was a great admirer of Hans Christian Andersen, or at least, he was until he met him, but in creating A Christmas Carol he out-Andersened Andersen by inventing a fable that would become legendary worldwide. While writing it he 'wept and laughed, and wept again and excited himself in a most extraordinary manner'. This is because he identified with his anti-hero Scrooge.

Several incidents in the story come from Dickens' life. He had indeed been left on his own at school, in his case in Chatham for a week after his family moved to London, although he was in the care of a teacher. Scrooge's failed love affair reflects Dickens' courtship, before he became famous, of Maria Beadnell; her parents disapproved of him and she broke off the relationship.

Money was uppermost in Dickens' mind at the time he wrote the *Carol* because the novel he was working on, *Martin Chuzzlewit*, wasn't selling well. But, although the *Carol* was an instant success, he lost money on it. He'd spent too much on the printing, and on top of that, he sued two writers who had plagiarised the story, won the case, but was left with a bill for costs after they declared themselves bankrupt. On a more positive note, his description of Scrooge at the end of the book. "It was always said of him that he knew how to keep Christmas well", would come to be reflected in Dickens' own legendary parties at Gads Hill.

There's also a spooky side to the *Carol*. Scrooge's sister, who rescues him from his school, dies young. She is thought to be based on Dickens' own elder sister Frances, who was a talented musician and did indeed die young... some five years after *A Christmas Carol* was first published.
